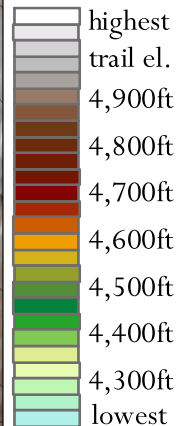


Fallen Peace Officer Trail

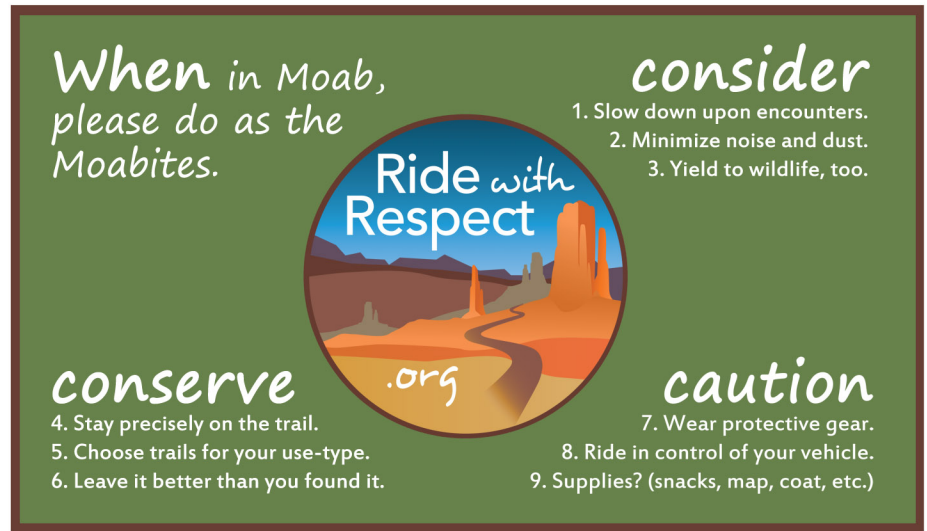
